Every child at Sybil Elgar has a diagnosis of autism. Our team of autism qualified and experienced staff has a wealth of practical experience to offer families who are seeking to find the right way forward for their child.

Learning at Sybil Elgar will be quite unlike learning anywhere else. Our approach to teaching children with autism is both creative and grounded in solid research. We support our students in every aspect of their school life, building confidence, social, behavioural and communication skills and giving them the resources they need to develop and prepare for adult life.

Your child will follow a personalised curriculum, and have access to an amazing range of performing arts. We know from research that when children enjoy dance, music and drama they learn better. Education at Sybil Elgar is education for life.

Our approach to assessment, recording and reporting

MyProgress[®] is The National Autistic Society's overall strategy for working with your child. With **MyProgress**[®], your child will have the best start in life because every aspect of their care and education is tailor-made for them. **MyProgress**[®] guarantees that your child will use approaches that The National Autistic Society has tried and tested over many years: we know that they make a difference.

An enriched curriculum for everyone

What makes Sybil Elgar special? We find ways to allow your child to learn, in whatever way they feel comfortable.

Everything we do is centred on your child. We make sure that our curriculum meets their specific needs and our multi-disciplinary team will closely support their learning in communication, social, behavioural, emotional, sensory, physical and selfhelp skills. At our school, your child will learn to develop a sense of selfworth and self-respect. We cater for a wide range of talents and abilities and are dedicated to helping every child along every step of the way.

The performing arts

In addition to our specially adapted academic curriculum, your child will find new opportunities and enjoyment throughout their time at school by learning to express themselves through music, dance and art.

We offer an extensive performing arts curriculum at our main school and in our sixth form and further education department to help our young people achieve and find fulfilment, from taking part in a music and movement display to playing the drums with the school band.

We look to the future

An important outcome of **MyProgress**[®] is ensuring that your child is ready to move on to the next stage in their life. We work closely with you, your child and our transition co-ordinator to create a **My Transitions Passport**. This document describes your child's skills, interests, aspirations and other key information to provide a clear plan for his or her future and lifelong learning.

MyProgress[®]

My teacher works with speech therapists, psychologists and, of course, my parents to assess all areas of my development. This helps everyone understand my strengths and needs.

Every term

My ability profile demonstrates the unique way autism impacts on me and my learning style.

MyProgress[®] **meeting** identifies what my school and my family can do to build on my strengths and interests and support me in the things I find difficult.

MyProgress[®] **plans** set out my academic, social and independence targets and says how the curriculum and timetable are going to be tailored to meet my needs.

MyProgress® curriculum puts significant emphasis on social communication skills, community-based learning and enterprise. The curriculum is delivered using the NAS SPELL philosophy that includes a blend of autism-specific interventions.

MyProgress[®] **file** provides evidence of my achievements across academic (eg literacy), social (eg turn taking), emotional (eg managing my emotions), and independence (eg caring for myself) aspects of learning.

MyProgress[®] **report** measures how I am doing against my targets by rating progress red, amber or green. My achievements in green are celebrated and my teacher develops an action plan to help me improve in those areas rated red.

Our teachers and support and advice team are all highly qualified and experienced, with a deep commitment to educating children with autism.

Teaching, care and support united

Wherever your child is with us, in class, learning essential life skills, or out in the community and our team provides them with consistent support, working closely together at all times.

Our therapists are all based in school, and are an integral part of the team. They work with our residential pupils too, so you can be sure that throughout every day your child is with people who know them well and understand how to teach and support them effectively. We monitor and assess your child constantly and because teachers, therapists and care staff work side by side we can adjust the teaching and support your child needs quickly and effectively in every aspect of their school life.

Putting your child first

We are always developing our curriculum so that it meets the specific needs of children with a diagnosis of autism. The most important things we teach are self-confidence, empowerment, problem solving, working together, self-esteem and valuing others. Your child's individual needs, skills and interests are always of primary importance when we plan their lessons.

We are constantly aware of how your child's autism affects their learning and experience of the world around them and we know that developing their communication, social and life skills will enable them to learn better.

Our curriculum

The academic curriculum includes English, mathematics, science, design and technology, ICT, art and design, music, PE, RE and food technology. We have daily personal, social, health and citizenship education (PSHCE) and sex and relationship education. Key stage 4 children follow the ASDAN Transition Challenge, and gain at least two units. In our sixth form, every young person gains social and vocational skills and qualifications.

Homework

Where appropriate students are set homework. We encourage you to share and contribute towards your child's home learning and we are available to support you in this.

Being part of the community

At Sybil Elgar, we encourage your child to take part in life outside the school gates. Your child will spend time in our vibrant London community, practising their daily living skills and enjoying themselves with friends.

We have strong links with the college and business community in Acton and our sixth form students benefit enormously from work experience in Acton Market, with businesses on the high street or with local horticultural enterprises.

A great place to learn

Our early years, primary and secondary site in Southall is light, modern and welcoming. It has newly refurbished, autism-friendly classrooms and teaching areas, a multi-sensory room, music therapy room, food technology teaching kitchen and student-run café.

Our post-16 department is on the campus of Acton College and offers a catering-standard teaching kitchen, together with a cafeteria and dining room specially designed by our young people. There is a sensory room, music centre, student common room and a modern performance space equipped with our inspiring interactive 3D floor projector.

We are also developing a business enterprise facility where students can learn about the office environment and develop their entrepreneurial skills.

Residential care at Sybil Elgar

We offer weekly term-time residential places in our residential house, Corfton Road. It is on a quiet, leafy residential road in Ealing, four miles from our school. Here our experienced team continue to support your child using exactly the same programmes and approaches as the staff at school.

At Corfton Road your child will have their own bedroom as well as access to a large, friendly kitchen, lounge and secure garden. There are lots of different evening activities for your child to choose from every day, both at home and in the community. We are close to Hanger Hill Park and have excellent public transport links so we like to get out and about as much as possible,

We put a firm emphasis on all our children learning life skills. Your child will help with making their own bed, washing their own clothes in the machine, clearing tables to help the support staff and cooking their own meals. Living at Corfton Road is a great way to become more independent.

We are also looking to develop a small 52-week residential facility for early 2015.

Informed and professional

Our unique nurturing environment

In our most recent Ofsted report, in November 2011, the inspectors say that our environment 'is highly structured and predictable. It is calm and uncluttered. Expectations are clear. This approach means that students who have significant and complex needs perceive the school as a safe place to learn.'

We offer a special combination of warmth and deeply informed expertise, and we look at every one of our students as an individual. Ofsted highlighted this, saying that our students 'thrive within a nurturing environment which centres on their uniqueness.'

No matter what challenges your child faces, we have decades of experience that we can draw on to help them through.

Our rigorous approach

Every child at Sybil Elgar has their own, individual programme, which we regularly update. With **MyProgress**[®], you can be sure that we are constantly monitoring and assessing your child to analyse their progress. We check that the approaches we are using with your child are the right ones for this stage of their development. Because our teaching, care and support staff work so closely together, we are quick to pick up problems and to decide how to respond.

Sound evidence

We never stop trying to find new and better ways to help our children and families. Our educational strategies are based on university-led research. For example, our psychologist worked with the Institute of Education to study how taking part in music and drama helps children with autism to enjoy learning and interacting with others.

Supporting families and young people

Family support

It is important to us to offer lots of practical support to parents. For instance, we have set up Parenting Partnership workshops to discuss a wide range of your concerns. We go out on home visits, perhaps to prepare your child's programme or to explain how to implement interventions at home.

Short breaks, activity weeks and our after school club

Taking a short break in our Ealing house is a good opportunity for your child to have a holiday and try some of the many activities we run while you take a well-earned rest. They are both fun, and designed to help your child develop important skills and to become more independent. They are run by our own staff, so your child will always be with people who have a thorough understanding of autism. We run our short breaks overnight or during weekends in term time. Our summer activity weeks take place during the school holidays. We offer a wide range of trips and activities, as well as time to relax and to learn new skills. Like our short breaks, they are staffed by our own, trained team.

We also offer an after school club. We provide tea and activities, with your child joining in with our residential students.

We offer education to young people aged 5 to 19 with autism who have been referred by their local authority.

Making an application

If you decide you would like to apply, you need to discuss your child's needs with your local authority, and make a joint application. Once you have made your application, we will assess your child.


